I want to thank all our Volunteers, those who donated and youth that participated and attended our VBS this year. We had 43 children

participating in this exciting week of fun and learning about our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. "Power Lab" used exciting "experiments" to help our children learn. I even was given a demonstration of walking on water---yes they did it as long as they kept their eye on the Lord. Take your eyes off the Lord and they sunk. Balloons with fears written on them were pushed down into water and guess what? They came to the surface again. This demonstrated that our fears keep coming to the surface no matter how deep we bury them. Only Christ can take these fears away. It was a great time and thank you for supporting this fantastic ministry for our children.

Summer is here and attendance is showing that we are a vacationing group. I want to thank Stephen Vinson for writing such a superb article on stewardship for last month's Legate. The politics at St. Alban's are also showing up in our stewardship. There are those who do not want to stay with the Diocese who have cut their support down to one dollar a week. There are those who cut their pledge in half. There are those who have pledged and not given any because of the stand your Rector has taken. I know that many of us are also feeling the crunch of the economic slow-down and the rising price on necessities. We too are feeling the crunch at St. Alban's. We are looking at possibilities at the present to see what can be done in this area. This will be painful in that most of our income goes to meet salaries for ministry and maintaining our buildings. There are very few extras given to luxury around St. Alban's. The finance committee will be giving a report on Sunday, July 13th at 9:15 in the Parish Hall to let everyone know where we are and what the possibilities are. I hope everyone will be in prayer about this situation and ask God to grant us courage, faith and trust in Him about what we can do together to face this challenge that has been given us.

The reception for Deacon Duncan and Elizabeth and the presentation by the finance committee will disrupt the 40 days of Discernment Bible Study. It will resume on Sunday, July 20th at 9:15 in the Parish Hall. A number of people said they will be traveling but would like the material. The Bible Study material will be available week by week in the Parish Office for those who would like to do the study on the road.

As I write this, we are still in negotiation between the General Contractor and the Insurance Company on the repairs for the storm damage. Our development committee has been working hard on choosing flooring material for the Narthex; paint color for the outside of the Church; receiving bids for the new lighting fixtures in the Church; as well as a host of other items prescribed in our Capital Campaign. I think it may be one of those situations where everything will start at once and we will have tons of work being done in multiple stages.

But the main work of the Church is to teach, live, and proclaim the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. As your Rector, my family and I will be going off to teach English to French teenagers and to share our faith in Jesus Christ with them. We will be back for a short time then off on vacation. I leave you in good hands of our Assistant Rector, Senior Warden and our two Deacons. Keep them on the straight and narrow for me.

St. Alban's Bookstore and Gift Shop will be open on Sunday mornings in July but will be closed on weekdays. Regular weekday hours will resume on August 4th.


New books have arrived in the Bookstore! Come by on Sundays to find interesting selections for summer reading. Here is a sampling from many to chose from:

The Words of Jesus: A Gospel of the Sayings of Our Lord, with reflections by Phyllis Tickle. This well-known Biblical scholar has organized the words of Jesus according to the audience to whom they were spoken. For example, you will find Words of Public Teaching, Words of Healing Dialogue, Words of Post-Resurrection Encounter, and more, accompanied by her reflections.

God Seekers; Twenty Centuries of Christian Spiritualities, by Richard H. Schmidt. A panorama of holy writing, worthy of study, from 32 Christians from the second century to the present. Each chapter is followed by a set of questions for personal reflection or discussion.

The Oxford Guide to The Book of Common Prayer; A Worldwide Survey, edited by Charles Hefling and Cynthia Shattuck. "A comprehensive resource, this collection of expert discussions helps us learn what Anglicanism has given to the literary heritage of Christianity and culture alike," from its original 1662 text to its many worldwide transformations.

Jesus A to Z, by Michael O'Neill McGrath. A brightly illustrated, lighthearted alphabet book for young children, each letter features the use of alliteration and a Bibleverse reference. For the adults reading to children, a concluding section poses



questions for each letter that can promote discussion with the child. The author/illustrator is an Oblate of St. Francis de Sales.

Saturday Book Club continues in July with the book The

Reluctant Healer: One Woman's Journey of Faith by Emily Gardiner Neal. We meet on the third Saturday of each month at 9 am in the church parlor. A review of the book states:

Emily Gardiner Neal was a skeptic in the early 1950's and a professional journalist. Strongly affected by witnessing a healing service, she felt compelled to investigate the phenomenon. She began to talk with those who were healed, their pastors, their families and their physicians. In the process, she began honestly to face her own apprehension, subsequently writing A Reporter Finds God Through Spiritual Healing. Her journey of faith and her participation in the healing ministry of the church for the next thirty years are recorded in her additional six books- all out of print. An anthology of those books has been skillfully written by Anne Cassel to share the essence of her timeless stories and her extensive research. The book, formerly titled Celebration of Healing is scripturally sound. The Episcopal Healing Ministry Foundation had sponsored the reprint of this work entitled The Reluctant Healer.

Come and join us as we read and discuss this work written by a woman who began her journey as an agnostic and eventually was ordained to the diaconate in the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh in 1978.

Tales From the Loft

Since as of June 10 we only need \$6,710. to be able of sign s contract with Ross King for another matching organ case, I thought I would review the process for finishing our organ project. Ross will need to take out the original case and all the pipes it contains before he can install the new matching case. At that point, we will only have the pipes sounding in the north case which are playable only on the lower keyboard. This will limit the repertoire played by the organist and sung by the choir. We will need to fill the new case with pipes as soon as we can.

Ross will be able to rescale and revoice some of the original pipes and put them with additional new ones to make some of the ranks for that new case. Of course, this will happen as we get money needed to sign the various contracts. \$172,658.44 has been given and spent alrready of this project. Kroger Rebate Program

Kroger has changed their organization rebate program, now calling it the *Kroger Neighbor to Neighbor Donation Program*, replacing the Kroger Share Card. This program runs from May 1, 2008 through April 30, 2009. For those of you with Kroger *Plus* cards who used the Share Card each time you shopped, this program will be much easier. Please take a copy of the Customer Letter located in the Narthex on the Visitor's Table, and the next time you stop at Kroger have the cashier scan your *Plus* card and then the barcode in the Letter. This will enroll your *Plus* card in the Neighbor to Neighbor program for the entire year, and St. Alban's will receive a portion of \$1,000,000 that Kroger will donate to all the enrolled charitable organizations. You will no longer need to have the Share Card scanned each time you shop. St. Alban's will receive a portion of the \$1,000,000 based on the percentage of our purchases compared to the other charitable organizations.

Stewardship Stimulus

Here is a boy with five small barley loaves and two small fish, but how far will they go among so many?

John 6:9

What will you do with your tax stimulus check? Pay bills, spend, save, give? Whatever you decide, you cannot really go wrong. Thanks to Congressional action in February, many of St. Alban's members will or may have already received their tax stimulus check. Rebates range from \$300 to \$1200 or more, depending on the family situation.

Some will welcome the tax rebate check and use it to pay bills, or may save some for the next "rainy day." For others, the check comes as an unexpected blessing they may choose to spend on one thing or another. Those who are charitably-minded may want to make a difference by sharing a portion of the windfall with groups that reflect their beliefs.

If you receive a tax rebate check, carefully consider your personal needs first. Then, if you are among those who might otherwise invest your rebate for the future, please prayerfully consider sharing all or part of it through an investment in St. Alban's ministries to others. As when Jesus fed the multitude with just five loaves and two fish, we are reminded that God takes our gift, no matter how large or small, and multiplies the impact. Remember: the amount of your rebate check is not subject to income tax. Then, when you itemize deductions on your 2008 tax return, you may be entitled to a tax deduction for the amount of your gift. This way you will enjoy another "rebate" as your deduction provides you with tax savings!

Oxford Movement Day Of Prayer

175th Anniversary Of The Oxford Movement by Robert Beaken

In 1833 the Church of England was startled by the Oxford Movement. The spark which ignited this powerful religious reawakening was the proposal of the Whig government to suppress half the Anglican bishoprics in Ireland and to re-dispose their incomes, without first consulting the Church. A group of clerical

dons at Oxford, of whom John Keble, John Henry Newman, Richard Hurrell Froude and Edward Bouverie Pusey are the most well-known, took grave exception to the Whigs' proposals. They believed that the Church is a divinely-founded society, with Jesus Christ at its head, and that its reform was nothing to do with a secular Parliament. Their campaign of opposition was inaugurated with an assize sermon preached by Keble in the university church of St Mary in Oxford on 14 July 1833, in which he called Whig government's planned legislation 'National Apostasy.' The Oxford dons next wrote a series of Tracts for the Times, examining aspects of the theological crisis created by the government's action, which they had delivered to every parsonage in England.

The Church of England, they taught, has passed through the Reformation, but it is not simply of the Reformation. It is not a Protestant Church (the word Protestant never appears in the Prayer Book, nor in any Anglican formularies), but it is a reformed catholic Church, a subtle but significant difference. The Church of England is the historic catholic and apostolic Church of England. It is part of the wider Church of Christ – a claim made on the title page of the 1662 Prayer Book - cleansed of medieval abuses and unscriptural accretions in the sixteenth century, but in all other respects in continuity with what went before. They pointed out that the Church of England has retained the historic three-fold ministry of bishop, priest and deacon; her bishops are part of the Apostolic Succession; her priests by their episcopal ordination are identifiable with Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox priests, and exercise the same priesthood; through them, her faithful are assured of a valid sacramental ministry.

The leaders of the Oxford Movement were highly intellectual and very serious men. They believed the Church of England to be under threat, and they sought to raise the whole tone of her life and witness. For them, what mattered above all else was personal and corporate holiness; and, because holiness may only grow upon a foundation of truth, they were especially concerned with doctrinal purity and theological orthodoxy.

The Oxford Movement teaches us that all truth ultimately comes from God: Jesus Christ himself said "I am the way, the truth and the life." Christian truth does not depend for its validity upon the opinions of individual Christians at any one time. Something is true simply because God makes it true and reveals it to us, and for no other reason. If all Christians decided to reject some aspect of

Christianity, this aspect would not thereby become untrue because of their rejection of it. Nor, if all Christians decided to believe in something new or decided to amend some old aspect of Christianity, would it therefore suddenly become true because of their new belief. God does not — indeed, he cannot — contradict Himself. Christian doctrine and moral teaching that were true in A.D. 33 and A.D.1833, remain true in A.D. 2008. They cannot have become false by reason of their contradicting current values and ideas, and because some people find them difficult.

The Oxford Movement did not go unchallenged, but it proved to be the most important religious reawakening in England during the nineteenth century. The renaissance of spirituality, theology, scholarship, liturgy, music, art, architecture, and the revival of religious orders and communities (monks and nuns), which the Oxford Movement began in the Church of England goes under the name of the Catholic Revival. To this day in the early twenty-first century, there is not a parish church in the Anglican Communion that has not been affected by it in some way or other. On 14 July 2008, the 175th anniversary of John Keble's Assize sermon, Anglicans throughout the world will observe an hour of silent prayer. We will give thanks for the rich inheritance of the Oxford Movement. We will also pray for the future, seeking to discover God's will and fulfil his purposes for us in our own lives, churches and communities. An hour of silent prayer will be held at noon on July 14th at St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Arlington, TX. We invite you to join us for this special time with the Lord.
